The kindergarten student, Cecelia Suchor, responded with, "I usually don't do bad stuff during the summer. I mostly act the same."


The first grade student, Lincoln Boer, stated, "I yell at my sister, and my dad tells me to ignore her, but I can't because she's too loud."
