Work-based learning addresses the delivery involving interactions with industry and community professionals. Experiences may occur in workplaces, the community and educational institutions.

On Sept. 14, the Redfield Competition cheerleaders hosted the Pheasant Invite. They got 3rd with a total of 119 points.


On Sept. 23, the cheerleaders attended the Sioux Valley Invite @Volga and got 5th with a score of 109 points.


For these activities they may team up with student council or FCCLA to make all of the activities come together.

FCCLA members received the opportunity to network with fellow youth


leaders and learn about career and college options through exploring the career pathways of Human Services, Hospitality and Tourism, Education and Training, and Visual Arts and Design.





es with Christmas lights.


A Christmas tradition many families might do is open one Christmas present on Christmas Eve. In my family, the parents pick out which present the kids get to open.


He had students from each grade help him with an activity where they held their arms out straight from their sides. He told them it wasn't a competition, and they could drop their arms anytime, but nobody did.



"It was a very cool experience for me to be able to sit in on the house sessions. I got






