The boys' golf team traveled to Dell Rapids to participate in the state golf tournament on October 1, where they received 12th place as a team.

Sophomore Isaac Suchor golfed a 86 on an 18 hole course. On Tuesday, he got a score of 93; he placed 26th.
Senior Micaiah Utecht golfed a 96 on Monday and a 101 on Tuesday. Utecht placed 66th.

Dylan Stephens, a junior, golfed a 97 on Monday and a 104
on Tuesday. Stephens placed 69th.
Jaxson Frankenstein, a sophomore, golfed a 110 on Monday and a 108 on Tuesday andplaced 88th.
Zach Jordan, a senior, golfed a 128 on both days and placed 104th.

That was the day that the nurses from the Community Memorial Hospital came to administer school flu shots.

Trypanophobia is the phobia of needles, or medical procedures involving injections.

## The Effects of Music on the Mind

Music is a part of everyday life for many. It can be the first thing a person hears in the morning or before they fall asleep. Music can have an influence on a person's mood, level of productivity, and focus.
One of the first things that happens when music enters our brains is the triggering of pleasure centers that release dopamine, a neurotransmitter that makes you feel happy. This response is so quick, the brain can even anticipate the most pleasurable peaks in familiar music and prime itself with an early dopamine rush.

Even in terms of brain development, music can play a key role. Training to play an instrument, for instance, is believed to increase gray matter volume in certain areas of the brain, not unlike how physical exercise can tone and enlarge muscles. As a result, musicians often experience improvement in brain functions like: auditory processing, learning and, memory.
In another study, scientists wanted to determine if relaxation and music therapy can reduce stress. Patients were randomly assigned to either relax, listen to music, or do nothing. Researchers discovered that hearing music led to a lower heart rate and normalized body temperatures. They concluded that these were effective ways to reduce stress in such environments.

Many of the beneficial effects of music on the brain are not limited to any single genre. Whether you're listening to the smooth jazz styling of Billie Holiday on vinyl, the classic country sounds of Johnny Cash on YouTube, or The Beatles on Spotify, different styles can produce the same results - as long as they align with your musical preferences. In this way, it's the brain's relationship with familiar and favored music that is key.
"My favorite music to listen to when I'm working on homework or study for a test is music that is very easy to listen to like Lauv or Ed Sheeran," stated Gwen Johnson.

One British study claims listening to Mozart for 10 minutes produced a "Mozart effect" where test-takers' IQ scores went up 8 or 9 points. A Bulgarian psychologist employed the method of playing Baroque era music, which plays at a tempo of 60 beats per minute, to help students learn foreign languages. After the 30-day course, the average retention rate per student was 92 percent. Even four years later, when students had not reviewed the material, most remembered the foreign language lesson.

Music has a great power over a person's mind and body. Music affects the brain and mood by engaging emotion, memory, learning, and attention.

# Student Body Rallies Behind Injured Wrestler

For senior Trevor Frost, Jan. 3 was just another wrestling meet against Webster and Groton. The team traveled to Webster, and Frost pinned his Groton opponent in the first period. Little did he know that his match against Webster would be his last one ever.

During the second period, Frost suffered a severely dislocated knee that also involved damage to the artery and nerves. He underwent emergency surgery at the Heart Hospital in Sioux Falls on Jan. 4 to remove a blood
clot that blocked the blood flow to his foot; he had a second surgery to insert a stent in the artery on Jan. 5. Frost has to wait until the end of March before he will know when the orthopedic surgeon will schedule surgery to fix the knee, and he will eventually have to have a bypass at the Heart Hospital to get more blood flow to his foot.
After Frost's injury happened, the high school student council decided to put on a fundraiser to help with Frost's medical expenses. They decided that for every \$100 raised, a teach-
er would get a strip of his leg hair waxed at the RARE assembly. The goal was to raise $\$ 1,000.00$.

By the end of the week, the $\$ 1,000$ goal had been exceeded, and all ten teachers had their legs waxed in front of the student body
at the assembly.

## Spink Co. Coalition Coordinator Gives Opioid Presentations to Students in Grades 6-11

by Elizabeth Fixsen Did you know that you have better odds of dying from an opioid overdose than of being in a car wreck? Prescription drug abuse continues to be a growing problem in communities near and far.
To educate students about opioids and the risk of addiction associated with prescription drugs, Mrs. Wasmoen, the Project SUCCESS facilitator, has been giving opioid presentations to students in 6th11th grade. The presentations began in February and will continue through the month of March.
The program used for the presentations was Prescription Drug Abuse- Preventing Youth Opioid and Rx Drug

Abuse.
Topics discussed in the presentation include what are prescription drugs, commonly abused prescription drugs, what does it mean to abuse prescription drugs, what rules are important for the safe use of prescription drugs, dangers of abusing prescription drugs, reasons for people abusing prescription drugs, and why most people do not abuse prescription drugs.
A prescription drug requires a medical prescription to be dispensed. Over-thecounter drugs can be obtained without a prescription. Abusing prescription drugs means taking a medication in a manner or dose other than prescribed.

Commonly abused prescription drugs include fentanyl, hydrocodone, hydromorphine, meperidine, methadone, and oxycodone.

Safely store prescription drugs by placing them in a locked cabinet outside of your bathroom.

There are two places to dispose of prescription drugs in Spink County. Prescription drugs can be disposed at the drop box between Randall's Pharmacy and the clinic or at the sheriff's office.

It is important that we are aware of the effects of opioids and we know what the consequences of misuse are. Education is an important step towards prevention.
